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Yes, APL is training cats!

Click. Treat. Click. Treat. Click. Treat. For about ten minutes, one of APL's half-dozen cat trainers watches for a desired cat behavior, depresses a clicker, and quickly delivers a treat to an eager feline.

About twenty shelter cats, along with five staffers and one volunteer were, this summer, the first APL participants in Cat Pawsitive—a positive-reinforcement-based training program developed by TV's "My Cat from Hell" host Jackson Galaxy and a team of animal behavior experts. The goal: enrich the lives of shelter cats and make them more appealing to adopters.

APL volunteer coordinator Mary leads APL's Cat Pawsitive team. She is working with three cats—Biscuit, Tomas, and Paddy—who live in the shelter's room set aside for FIV-positive cats. Although cats with the immune system-suppressing virus can live normal lifespans, they often are overlooked by adopters. The three cats were identified for Cat Pawsitive because they were rated "relaxed" and "alert."

Eager learners

The three are eager learners. As soon as one of her students sits on cue, Mary presses

the clicker and quickly delivers a treat. Motivated by the treats, the cats quickly sit multiple times, each time immediately acknowledged with a click and a treat. But the cats aren't just watching Mary. Biscuit and Tomas are observing and learning from each other, says Mary.

To avoid over-stimulating the cats, the session lasts only ten minutes. Once they've mastered sitting on command, the trio will move on to learning "high fives"—raising one front paw to meet

Mary's open hand. Eventually, APL's Cat Pawsitive cats will work at learning to head bump, come when called, and "best of all," says trainer Lisa, "to jump through a hoop."

The behaviors are designed to build on each other, either by what is called "targeting"—getting the cats to aim for a spot, such as an open hand—or "luring"—enticing the cats to move in a particular way, as through a hoop.

PRESIDENT'S COMMENTS



All of the dogs and cats that come to APL deserve a loving home, and a full and happy life. Sadly, because of life experiences beyond their control ... abuse, illness, neglect ... they may not be ready for adoption. Does APL give up? No! Our dedicated

staff and volunteers are determined to give dogs and cats better lives. Consider these cases:

- When Arnie came to APL, the dog was aggressive and frightened of everyone. He was put in a kennel run where he could go outside via the doggie door. He was given a treat by nearly everyone who walked by. Eventually he warmed up to kennel staff and especially to Andrew. He is social with other dogs, and may be walked by most kennel staff and select volunteers.
- Fosters are essential in getting some of our hardto-place cats in forever homes. Whenever kittens or cats enter APL too scared or fractious to be handled by the public, our veteran fosters step in to help. They open their homes and give the cats or kittens freedom to socialize on their own schedules. The transition to a forever home is easier because the foster caregiver can give the potential adopter invaluable information about how the cat acts in a home environment.
- Briggs is a good dog who likes almost everyone, but he doesn't have manners. He likes to mouth things, which can be scary if you don't know his intention. This obviously is not a behavior that will get him adopted quickly. Kennel staff have worked with him to give him defined rules and boundaries. He is an intelligent dog and is making progress. Potential adopters have a framework to build on. Once an adopter can see the


- potential in a dog, it can go a long way to getting him a forever home.
- Sweet cat Taz arrived with serious eye issues that required two surgeries. He is a loving boy and will require time to recover. Foster caregiver Robin has taken Taz into her home during his recuperation and is showering him with lots of love.
- Fearful dog Minnie arrived at APL with serious injuries to her tail and ears. We suspect that someone tried to bob her tail and cut her ears, doing serious damage. No wonder she has trust issues. Our vets did a great job stitching her up and fixing her ears. We shower her with love and treats. She is making slow but sure progress in allowing people beyond kennel staff into her life.
- Tomas is a cat with serious health issues, including FIV. Five staff members and one volunteer were part of the Jackson Galaxy Project program Cat Pawsitive, which teaches cats to sit, high-five, nose bump, jump through hoops, and more. Tomas is a Cat Pawsitive All Star! He led the way in the FIV room where other cats emulated him. Showing potential adopters that cats can do tricks helps them get adopted more quickly and lets their true personalities shine through. Tomas and many of his roommates have been adopted.

I am so proud of the devotion, innovation, and perseverance of APL staff! Many animals come to us broken in body or spirit. But no one gives up on them. No one stops working until they are happy and placed in loving, forever homes of their own.

Of course, cats being cats, doesn't mean that all of them will learn all the behaviors—or accomplish them at the same rate. Mary's student Joan is a "reluctant learner" who is picky about her treats. "She has to be in the mood" or she simply refuses to participate, says Mary. That's too bad, because Joan has been at APL for four years, and being more engaged with potential adopters could be her ticket out of the shelter.

Increasing adoptions

Getting cats out of the shelter and into new homes is the goal of Cat Pawsitive. The first cats in APL's training program were identified as likely eager students for our novice trainers, but the positive-reinforcement training is especially important for stressed cats. Pawsitive training is intended to draw out cats who are shy, nervous, or overwhelmed by shelter life. By interacting with trainers, the cats gain confidence and become comfortable interacting with visitors, increasing their chance for adoption.

One APL volunteer is participating in Cat Pawsitive training. Melissa trains cats on the week-days when she helps clean cat cages. She likes adding "something different" to her daily routine at the shelter, and so do the cats, she says. They get extra attention, and "it's good to know I'm trying to help them get adopted."

Training the trainers

of the trainers' training? The absolutely essential timing of observing the desired behavior, pressing the clicker, and delivering the treat. The team watched a video together and practiced the deceptively hard-to-master trick of holding and pressing the clicker in one hand, delivering the treat in the other, and quickly following the click with a treat. All met together initially before individually working their way through online tutorials, with some of our trainers logging

twenty hours as they learned the Cat Pawsitive curriculum.

Mary is enthusiastic about Cat Pawsitive program, believing that the behaviors—tricks, if you will—can help cats like Paddy stand out from the crowd. Mary thinks that Cat Pawsitive will change how potential adopters look at cats. More often than not, she says, people are attracted to a cat because of its color, and may seek out one that looks like a cat they've previously owned. Cat Pawsitive puts the focus "on making a connection with the cat" in the way that dog adopters do, who are more likely to respond to a dog's behavior.


Six months into Cat Pawsitive, 9 cats in the program have been adopted, 4 have gone to permanent foster homes, and a total of 38 have been in training. But just as importantly, APL has trainers who can continue to enrich the lives of cats that pass through our doors and help them go out our doors sooner to new homes. That leaves more life-saving room for cats!


The following are just a few of numerous examples.

FERAL FIXES

APL supports trap/ neuter/return (TNR) to reduce the number of stray and feral cats.

Our low-cost clinic offers reduced-cost spay/neuter and vaccinations of outdoor stray and unsocialized cats, who are then returned to their neighborhoods or colonies.

TNR stabilizes feral cat populations by eliminating new litters, and it reduces nuisance behaviors associated with unsterilized cats. TNR is the only humane method of reducing feral cat populations. TNR reduces the number of feral cats/kittens that enter municipal animal shelters, which in turn lowers euthanasia rates and increases adoption of shelter cats.

Want to help feral cats in your neighborhood? APL will guide caretakers through the trapping process and also loan traps for TNR. Call the clinic at 217-789-7729.



Be warm, be safe

Winter can be beautiful, snow-covered playgrounds for people and pets alike IF proper precautions are taken. Just as bitter cold, dry air, chilly rain, windchill, ice, and deep snow can take a toll on humans, it can harm pets as well. Observe the following precautions to keep your dog and cat happy and healthy during the cold weather months.

- Keep your home humidified and towel dry your pet as soon as she comes inside. Dry heat of your home can cause itchy, flaking skin. Remove any snow balls from between foot pads.
- Never shave your dog down to the skin in winter. A longer coat will provide more protection, even if your animal is outside only briefly. Consider getting a coat for short-haired dogs.
- Wash and dry your pet's feet and stomach to remove ice, salt and chemicals after outside walks.
 Check for cracks between pads and redness between toes.
- Bathe your pets as little as possible during cold spells. Washing too often can remove essential oils and cause dry, flakey skin. Use moisturizing shampoo.
- Massage petroleum jelly or other paw protectants into paw pads before going outside. Consider using booties if needed. Use pet-friendly ice melts.
- Antifreeze is a lethal poison for cats and dogs. Be sure to thoroughly clean up any spills and consider using products that contain propylene glycol rather than ethylene glycol.
- Make sure your companion has a warm place to sleep, off the floor and away from drafts

- Feed your pet a little more in the winter.

 Pets burn extra energy trying to stay warm in the winter.
- Feral, outdoor cats need food, water, and shelter to protect them from harsh elements. Make sure they have a shelter, adequate food, and fresh water.
- Protect your pet during loud, holiday festivities. Crowds, loud noises, unfamiliar people, dangerous "human" food, and some lethal holiday plants are stressful and potentially fatal to animals. Give your cat or dog a safe, quiet place to go during holiday celebrations.
- If it's too cold for you, its probably too cold for your pet, so keep your animals inside. Pets can freeze, become disoriented, lost, stolen, injured or killed. Never leave your pet alone in a car, period. In cold weather, cars can become refrigerators that hold the cold and cause animals to freeze to death.

Our wonderful pets always need our care and protection, but especially so during extremes of weather. Make sure yours have all they need to make it safely through the cold weather season. If you see an animal suffering in the cold, please report it to your local animal control facility. Don't turn your back and assume someone else will report it. You may be a distressed animal's only hope.



Rose found her dream job at APL

Rose was volunteering every day at the local animal control facility when she told a friend there, "If I could just get paid for it, it would be my dream job." Her friend's reply: "APL has a job opening." Rose marked her third year at her dream job in July 2018.

There is no typical day, says Rose, of her work as an animal care attendant, primarily of dogs, but her number one priority every day is "making sure the dogs are happy, clean, and wellcared for." That includes walking, feeding, and socializing them, as well as cleaning their kennels. Rose wards off canine boredom with frozen treats, toys, training, and lots of interaction with the dogs as she goes about her day. And with dogs entering the shelter or leaving with their adopters most days, Rose also must find time to conduct dog "intakes" (assess their physical condition, observe their behavior, and provide vaccines), talk to potential adopters, and prepare dogs to go to their new homes.

And then there are the sick dogs, often puppies. "My motherly instinct is for dogs," she laughs. She finds it "very fulfilling" to care for sick puppies and "bottle babies" that require intensive care. Dedicated volunteers who perform many of the kennel's routine tasks free up Rose to provide specialized care for ailing dogs and to train others who need to have good behaviors reinforced, as well as those who need to learn basic manners. "If not for volunteers, we would die!" she declares.

Rose also is APL's unofficial guide to the butterfly colony in the gardens on the west side of the shelter, and she can be found explaining the life cycle of butterflies to curious visitors.

If Rose's days sound busy, you're right. But "being here with the animals all day long" is what she likes about the job. It is especially gratifying to be surrounded by volunteers and staff members who "love the dogs as much I love these dogs," she says.

Caring for two dozen dogs a day doesn't dampen Rose's enthusiasm for her own pets, including four dogs, more than a dozen exotic birds, two bearded dragons, a tree frog, and a chameleon. All are rescues, except for one bird who was purchased as a companion to a distressed cockatiel.

"My whole life revolves around animals," says Rose, who is part of an informal reptile rescue group and a member of Illini Bird Fanciers. And she wouldn't have it any other way. Is there anywhere else she'd work besides APL? She laughs, "Maybe a zoo!"

Dogs transformed after rescue from hoarders


alnourished and skinny, matted and covered in feces," is how WICS news described the ninety-one dogs rescued from hoarders in Franklin County in August 2018. All of the dogs were transferred to Illinois no-kill shelters, and five needing veterinary treatment came to APL.

The five females, ranging in age from four to eight years old, had birthed multiple litters, suffered with dental issues, and tested positive for heartworms. APL was just the place for them! Our vets spayed them in our clinic, and all had their teeth cleaned to improve their health. After

the dogs had a couple of weeks to gain strength, they were treated for heartworms.

The dogs were shy, but not as poorly socialized as dogs typically rescued from hoarding situations. It didn't take long for Checkers, Mimi, Furby, Raja, and Samara to be adopted into new homes.

It took just one concerned citizen to report the hoarding to authorities, multiple organizations to rescue the dogs, and many generous APL donors to transform the lives of the five dogs who needed us the most.

Tips from the Trainer

Certified Associate Dog Trainer Joe Blankenship is owner of Dog Class Professional Dog Training. He also is a certified humane investigator, and he works closely with APL to rehabilitate dogs with behavioral problems so they will be adoptable.

APL Many people contact APL about problems they have with their dog's disruptive barking. Why do dogs bark?

Joe Dogs bark as a response to outside stimulation. It might be a sound, another animal or person, basically anything that gets their attention or that they perceive as a threat. Sometimes, dogs bark with joy, such as when their humans return home.

APL What reinforces dogs' barking?

Joe If a dog barks when it sees another dog walking down a sidewalk and that dog disappears from view, the barking dog has "won" by driving it away. Message to dog: barking works!

Some dogs engage in "havoc" barking, essentially to hear themselves bark, sometimes from boredom or frustration. Often people will give a barking dog a treat to distract it or give it attention. To the dog, this is success! Again the dog has won and will repeat the behavior.

APL One dog barks at the TV every time an animal of any kind appears on the screen. Her owners are careful not to reward her in any way. Still, the barking persists.

Joe Again, this dog is receiving outside stimulation that, in her mind, requires a barking response. I'm sure she experiences a lot of success in driving the animal off the screen. Her owners might try to redirect her focus with a leash. Sometimes it works to walk the dog away from the TV altogether.

APL What else?

Joe With a tough situation such as this, or any time unwanted behavior persists or gets worse,

consult a professional trainer.

APL A person contacted APL about a problem he was having when he took his dog on walks. The dog would bark at every other dog they encountered. What advice would you give to him?

Ioe This is a classic case of a dog's responding to the stimulation of other dogs who may be seen as competition for the owner's attention or who may, on some level, be seen as threats. When the owner tries to take his barking dog away from the other dog, his dog has won again. He has made the offending "other" go away. Refocusing the dog's attention often helps. Reinforcing the good behavior if the dog pauses barking may help. Again, consult a professional trainer if undesirable behavior persists.

All dogs bark for a reason that makes sense to them. The trick is figuring out what that reason is and redirecting the behavior elsewhere.

Cats and dogs undergoing surgery in our clinic wear these snug-fitting masks while undergoing spay/neuter and other surgeries. With more than 13,000 animals per year coming through the spay/neuter clinic, the masks get a work-out. After thousands of uses and thousands of dousings in disinfectant, the masks lose their flexibility, their gaskets loosen, and they begin to crack.

Our clinic needs two dozen new masks at a total cost of more than \$700. Your donation to fund their purchase means

that we'll have more money available to cover the expenses of animals who need APL most—the sick, injured, and abandoned cats and dogs who might well die without our intervention.




